Note from the President

We all love bikes, but who could have guessed at the beginning of the year that bike repair in 2020 would be deemed an "essential business" or that demand for bicycles would surge and bike shops would run out of inventory at the beginning of summer? More people cycling could bode well for increased awareness among the general public of bicycles and cyclists, with improvements in bicycle infrastructure and traffic safety to follow. In a year when my plans to do several bike tours, here and abroad, have been scuttled due to a global pandemic, I have been looking for a silver lining – anywhere. And I'm just talking bikes, not politics.

Covid-19 has had quite an impact on the club. Here's what's going on at HeartCycle:

- 1. Cancellation of remaining 2020 tours: The Board has cancelled the last two tours of the 2020 season, Black Hills and Southern Ohio. In retrospect, we were fortunate to have one tour completed before things closed down. While quite a few club members are still itching to do a tour, particularly one within a reasonable drive of their home, Covid-19 has made many reluctant to travel or to do anything which might risk infection.
- 2. 2021 Tour Schedule: While no one knows what the future holds, we remain optimistic about 2021 and that our club members will want to do bike tours. Riding a bike in the great outdoors is still a salubrious and rewarding activity. And I believe people still want to travel and see the world by bike. Tour Director Judy Siel and tour leaders have been working hard to assemble an attractive menu of tour offerings for 2021 as well as developing protocols for safe conduct of tours. We anticipate that there may be more demand than in the past for single rooms. Look for announcements of these tours in upcoming newsletters.
- 3. Annual meeting: Sadly, we will not have an annual meeting at the Mount Vernon Country Club this year. The Board decided that it is not a good idea to plan an event of 100+ people for an indoor space in late October. However, we still need to transact a bit of business: viz., board elections for expiring terms. Therefore, we are working on conducting an election via our website. More details to follow.

Keep your legs turning and don't lose your bicycle conditioning. Bike touring will return.
