North Puget Sound Favorites Tour

With impeccable riding weather and long summer days just south of the Canadian border, new and old friends gathered in Anacortes, Washington, to experience the North Puget Sound favorites tour, an apt title. Following a long hiatus in HeartCycle tours for most participants, we welcomed the opportunity to share stories and create new ones. For some of us, it was a bit of a reunion, as our last tour was the 2020 Las Vegas & Death Valley Spring Training event that evolved into a peculiar pandemic shutdown tour, such that the bright lights off the Las Vegas strip, visitor centers, hotels, and restaurants closed their doors, as we spun off into the cactusspiked desert. Our recent gathering in the Pacific Northwest with one of the same tour leaders, Richard Williamson from Anacortes, and the same two stupendous SAGS, Mayoma Pendergast and Kathleen Schindler, felt like a reawakening. Dave Olausen, another Anacortes local, rounded out leadership of our Puget Sound tour, who also rode the 2020 Las Vegas and Death Valley COVID shutdown tour.



Our route included fixed bases from two locations with six days of riding totaling 362 miles and 20,825 feet of elevation gain (individual GPS results will vary). For some, the routes were familiar favorites, whereas for others the perpetually rolling, glacially scoured terrain was a new experience. The Majestic Inn in central Anacortes on Fidalgo Island was conveniently located near restaurants, pubs, markets, and the ferry terminal. Deer roaming nearby roads with seagulls patrolling the skies were appreciated from windows with petite balconies. Daily, fresh-ground coffee for the press pots in our rooms was a big hit. From Anacortes, Day-One included a pedestrian bridge over shallow Fidalgo Bay. Riders were far away from cars, but up close and personal to broken clamshells dropped by feasting seagulls. Although our tour leaders did warn us about these potential shell hazards, yours truly managed the first flat of the tour from a tiny shell shard. After a rapid, group-assisted repair, we were rolling again through the Skagit Valley north to Chuckanut Drive, sometimes referred to as Washington's Big Sur, with photogenic views of Samish Bay and beyond to the San Juan Islands.



Reluctantly parting ways with the curvy sandstone cliffs of Chuckanut Drive, we skirted the shores of Lake Samish. Although road surfaces were generally good, extensive stretches were topped with chipseal, where layers of asphalt are combined with fine aggregate resulting in a surface that tends to vibrate the handlebars a bit. Potholes were kept to a minimum, but those present proved scathing. In the morning following a heartfelt safety briefing included in our orientation meeting, many of us were angrily confronted with a poorly repaired pothole. One tour leader was sent flying along the chipseal resulting in a yard sale of possessions to gather. Did you ever locate that missing credit card, Richard? Adding insult to unfortunate injury, at our tasty lunch we learned that the planned route ahead was temporarily closed due to road construction. No worries, with the help of the remaining tour leader and the SAGS, the riders improvised and rerouted back to Anacortes.



On Day-Two, we headed south through the Swinomish Reservation and the town of La Conner, the home of the novelist Tom Robbins of "Even Cowgirls Get the Blues" fame. As the greater Seattle area is home to numerous active HeartCycle members, we were joined by a couple of locals who couldn't resist an excuse to ride. Passing by Fir Island, a site of frequent winter floods and federally declared disasters, we headed up into the foothills of the Cascade Mountains, along Big Lake, and through the town of Mt. Vernon along the Skagit River before retracing our route back through La Conner. Our group dinner was at Anthony's restaurant featuring tasty seafood and overlooking the yachts at Cap Sante Marina.



Day-Three was a real treat. The ferry ride from Fidalgo Island across the Rosario Strait threaded the needle between Blakely and Decatur Islands en-route to Lopez Island.













The quiet country roads of Lopez Island were punctuated by side-trips to walking trails such as in Spencer Spit State Park. Switching to walking shoes portaged in backpacks, we strolled along the spit to within almost touching distance of Frost Island. In the intervening calm waters were river otters splashing about with a bald eagle flying overhead in the blue skies. Rolling on, our lunch stop at Agate Beach pleased all with the views and quite possibly one of the coziest, welcoming bathroom breaks of the tour.





Later, we enjoyed another walk to Shark Reef with a nearby view of San Juan Island. Along the trail, someone decorated a recently uprooted tree with smiling leaves. Even the leaves were having a nice day on the island. Zooming off to make the semi-scheduled ferry, we arrived at the dock with minutes to spare for our return to Anacortes. Others were not quite as lucky.



Leaving Anacortes and Fidalgo Island behind on Day-Four, we headed south through the foggy pedestrian Loop Road in Washington Park before crossing from Fidalgo to Whidbey Island.

The Deception Pass Bridge, completed back in 1935, was presently getting a structural makeover. As traffic was light, we occupied the entire southbound lane, but dense fog precluded views of the swirling waters almost 200 feet below. For those with acrophobia though, that was a positive feature. The name Deception Pass stems from the late 1700s when Joseph Whidbey, chief navigator for Captain Vancouver aboard the HMS Discovery, demonstrated that there was indeed a passage between the islands, not a bay as mapped by the early Spaniard explorers. Voyaging south, our SAG stop at Dugualla Bay emerged from the fog and provided freshly picked roadside blackberries. With the maritime surveillance P-3C Orions and suitably named EA-18G Growlers growling overhead, we traversed the edge of the Ault Field Naval Air Station. For a number of miles, we experienced the slogan, "Pardon our Noise. It's the Sound of Freedom" first hand until reaching the quiet shores of Penn Cove near Coupeville. For those interested in rounding out their miles for the day, some added the lollipop-loop around Strawberry Point with views east towards Skagit Bay. Largely off busy roads, our routes had numerous changes in compass azimuth keeping riders wondering if they were enjoying views of the Cascades or the Olympic Mountains.










Persisting without our freshly ground coffee and press pots, our hotel base in Oak Harbor provided access on Day-Five to the numerous shoreline views along the central and southern Whidbey Island undulating landscape. Along the way, we passed Fort Casey, constructed in the late 1800s for military defense and a training facility through World War II. The fort is now a state park adjacent to the Port Townsend-Coupeville Ferry terminal. Following a lunch among the trees in South Whidbey State Park, riders opted for the "short" option heading back through Coupeville and calm vistas over Penn Cove towards the volcano of Mt Baker.



Wrapping up the tour on Day-Six, we retraced our path north from Oak Harbor over the Dike Road at Dugualla Bay and back over the Deception Pass bridge to the most formidable climb of the tour, the Mt. Erie challenge with gradients up to 20%!? But who was able to really watch their GPS devices while attempting to manage turning the cranks at a very slow, but deliberate pace in order to keep from falling over. Views from the peak afforded the opportunity to revisit our routes of the tour from a bird's-eye view including an island within an island. A truly unique spot. The ride concluded at the home of our generous tour leader Richard Williamson, who along with his gracious wife, Beth, prepared a fresh salmon BBQ! What a way to wrap up a fantastic tour. We even had a rider acknowledgement of most smiles per mile! We had a clear winner...



The serpentine ride along the forested cliffs of Chuckanut Drive, pedaling the peaceful roads of Lopez Island, and conquering the steep slopes of Mt. Erie were surely tour highlights. We look forward to our next jaunt in the Pacific Northwest.
