Tour 1: Heart of Holland - May 21-31, 2016 and

Tour 2: Friesland - June 1 -21, 2016

BRIEF TOUR DESCRIPTIONS:

Tour 1 - Heart of Holland will start and end in Amsterdam. Our first day will include a gorgeous ride along the Vecht to Vianen near Utrecht. Next day we ride from Vianen to Tiel along the Linge Route full of farms with berries and cherries and wonderful cafes. Then on to the old city of Nijmegen along a lovely route part way on old dikes and along with a visit to the Wooden Shoemaker and to the bicycle museum in Nijmegen. The Sarah will spend a rest day in Nijmegen giving you the opportunity to either just explore that very old city first founded by the Romans or ride your bikes to Kleve, Germany a beautiful medieval town. Wednesday- you cycle to and through the National Park-Hoge Veluwe and visit the Kroller/Muller Museum. From there it's on to the beautiful old town of Deventer with a stop at Het Loo Palace- one of the most beautiful in the Netherlands. From Deventer we move on to Kampen via Zwolle. We will be cycling in the historic region of the Overijssel formerly a major shipping area along the Zuiderzee for trade with the Baltic countries. All the towns are rich in history and beautiful architecture from the 1400's and later. On our way to Spakenburg we have one of our most scenic cycling days with little towns and beautiful countryside. We will pass through the Veluwe region with its lovely forests on our way back to Amsterdam. On the way you stop in Nunspeet which is famous for its monuments - one called the Hidden Village is famous for hiding Jews in WW II. We will spend part of our last day cycling in Amsterdam one of the world's most bike friendly cities. Our last night of the tour will be in Amsterdam aboard the Sarah. Tour Leader is Joanne Speirs

Tour 2 – Friesland will start and end in Amsterdam as well. Our first day will include a visit to Marken and Monickendam on our way to Hoorn and Enkhuizen. We will then cross the ljsselmeer (ljssel Lake) formed in 1932 when a nearly 20 mile long dam closed off the Zuiderzee (South Sea) from the North Sea. Now we'll be in Friesland a beautiful agricultural province in The Netherlands and a bit off the beaten tourist path. We'll pass through Staavoren and Harlingen before taking a day to explore one of the barrier islands in the North Sea, Terschelling. As we ride to the capital of Friesland, Leeuwarden we will pass by some of the 195 windmills still found in that province. The Netherlands also has several national parks and we'll be riding through Park De Alde Faenen and Weerribben on our way the village of Giethorn, known as the "Dutch Venice". We conclude tour riding along the southern edge of the ljsselmeer stopping in the picturesque towns of Huizen, Naarden on our way back into Amsterdam. As in Tour 1, we will spend part of our last day cycling in Amsterdam one of the world's most bike friendly cities. Our last night of the tour will be in Amsterdam aboard the Sarah. Tour Leader is John Penick.

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Zig Zag Road Striping Calms Traffic

At 11 points in northern Virginia, the familiar straight dashed lines on the road gives way to a series of zig zags. The unusual markings are meant to alert drivers to be cautious where the Washington and Old Dominion (W&OD) Trail intersects with the road and bicyclists and pedestrians frequently cross.



The zig zag markings slowed average vehicle speeds, increased motorist awareness of pedestrians and cyclists, and increased the likelihood that drivers would yield. They also noted that the effects of the design change didn't wear off once motorists became used to the it — they still slowed down a year after installation.

The results indicate that zig zag markings are a more cost-effective solution for conflict points between trails and high-speed roads than the current treatments: flashing beacons placed above the road or off to the side.

The effect of the zig zag markings was measured using speed radars over the course of a year. Feedback from motorists, cyclists, and pedestrians was also collected using online surveys. While the survey did not come from a random sample, 65 percent of drivers said they were more aware because of the markings and 48 percent said they liked them. The zig zags were also popular with cyclists; 71 percent said the markings affected driver behavior.

Said one respondent: "Drivers rarely stopped before the markings were installed. Since installation, they stop much more often."

OVERVIEW

Our ride begins in the one of the most visited and intriguing towns in the Southwest, Santa Fe. There you can experience festivities blending Indian, Hispanic and Anglo cultures, one-of-a-kind shops, distinctive art galleries and great restaurants in one of the oldest cities in America. It is worthy of an early arrival.

On our first day we will ride the beautiful Camino Alto (high road) to Taos. Taos is an artistic colony abounding in interesting shops, quaint and winding streets and adobe architecture. On day two, we leave Taos and follow the Rio Grande River, climb to a breathtaking view of the gorge below and cross the sparsely traveled Ortega Plateau to Abiquiu, a tiny traditional Hispanic village and the home and studio of Georgia O'Keeffe.

Leaving Abiquiu, we ride to the foot of the San Juans with beautiful mountain views enroute to Chama, an old mining town and terminus of the Cumbres and Toltec Railroad. We depart Chama and ride through the Carson National Forest and the Tusas Mountains crossing the Rio Grande Gorge Bridge and returning to Taos.

The fifth day is a rest day in Taos. But for the more intrepid, an optional ride is available on the "Enchanted Circle" over Palo Flechado and Bobcat Passes through alpine valleys and by the Red River and Eagle Nest Ski Resorts. From Taos we go to Angel Fire and drop down into the town of Las Vegas, New Mexico. We return on the final day to Santa Fe.



Note: This tour includes four long rides of over 75 miles. We will be at over 7,000 feet in elevation for most of the tour and there are generous amounts of climbing.

Southern Utah Tour 2015

Somehow I volunteered (or was it drafted?) for the responsibility of detailing and documenting the 12 day HeartCycle Tour through the incredible natural wonders of Southern Utah – Zion, Bryce and Capital Reef National Parks as well as Cedar Breaks Nat'l Monument. First, let me state for the record, I am a HeartCycle Rookie. This was my first HeartCycle trip. Our highly experienced and amazing sag leaders Kathleen and Mayoma were helpful in clarifying my biking status in our initial group meeting as a HeartCycle "Virgin" . I was not alone. Our first day biking was approximately 70 miles and included a stop and ride up through Kolob Canyon which was our initial introduction to Zion National Park. From Kolob we journeyed on through quaint little western towns – Toquerville (surprisingly not situated in Colorado) and Virgin, Utah to our ultimate destination: Springdale and the Gateway to Zion National Park. The beauty of this entire trip was how well it was planned and staged with fantastic biking intermixed with hiking. After a day or two of biking we had the opportunity to hike and explore the National Parks that we visited. Our second day of the tour was a free day to hike and explore the beauty of Zion – The Narrows, Angels Landing, Hidden Canyon – incomparable! An added bonus.... The Music Festival in downtown Springdale.




Our planned trek through Zion to Mount Carmel required a slight detour when a boulder the size of a California mansion fell across the road effectively blocking all traffic. This touring disaster was averted thanks to the resourcefulness and fast thinking of our leaders John Penick and Bob Racier who were able to secure group transportation for everyone and our bikes to Mount Carmel via a minor 100+ mile detour. A major debacle was rendered a minor inconvenience by their quick response and arduous efforts.



Bryce National Park. Wow. Entering into Bryce along the bicycle path through Red Canyon was amazing in itself but the scenery in Bryce... spectacular. Great food and 3.2 adult beverages at Rubys... memorable. Hiking the Hoodoos on our day off.... The best! Watching the Blood Moon from the park overlooks at Bryce... a "Once in a Lifetime Experience"!
